


Day of the Dead | Action Guide

October 26 – November 4, 2016



About Day of the Dead National Actions

Since 2003, 164 people have died in immigrant detention, including 10 deaths in Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) custody this year alone. From October 26 to November 4, DWN members and allies will mark the Latin American Holiday, Día de los Muertos or Day of the Dead, with national actions.

The Day of the Dead National Action aim to honor the lives of those who have died in immigrant detention, as <u>recent investigations into deaths in detention</u> have found that inadequate medical care has contributed to numerous deaths. Our goal is to have at least 10 cities across the country participate in the actions to highlight the 10 untimely deaths that have occurred this year, while amplifying the voices of those who have been directly-impacted by the immigration detention system.

Our Demands

- An immediate review of the 10 deaths in ICE custody this fiscal year, and publication of these reviews by January 30, 2017
- The immediate shut down of LaSalle Detention Center, where three of this year's deaths have occurred

Target(s)

ICE (Director Sarah Saldaña) and local targets including local elected officials, if facility contract is an Intergovernmental Service Agreement.

How You Can Get Involved

Host an event that will amplify detention center deaths. These activities can include:

- Vigils
- Funeral
- Rally/demonstration
- Teach-ins
- Press conference
- Theatrical or artistic expressions
- Processions
- Direct actions

Talking Points

Current Moment

People locked up in immigration detention reaches a record breaking high.

- With detention numbers starting to rise this summer, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) is currently detaining a record breaking high of over 40,000 people. The skyrocketing detention numbers are unprecedented and are estimated to climb to 47,000 people in detention by June of 2017.
- The appalling number of people behind bars has resulted in ICE scrambling to enter into and renew contracts with notorious private prison companies and county jails for increased detention capacity. This includes renewing the Dilley Family Detention Center in Texas which is run by the private prison company, Corrections Corporation of America.
- This action from ICE is particularly concerning amidst the growing call to end the use of private prisons and scale back incarceration, which includes:
 - This summer's announcement by the Department of Justice to end contracts with private prisons used for immigrants, also known as shadow prisons.
 - The Department of Homeland Security's pending investigation on the use of private prisons for ICE detention.
- ICE officials disclosed that "they're scraping the bottom looking for beds" raising concerns that the new contracts may not conform to detention standards, which could lead to more deaths.

Day of the Dead

A day to remember and celebrate the lives of loved ones.

- Rooted in indigenous traditions of Mesoamerica, Día de los Muertos or Day of the Dead, brings awareness to the passing of loved ones through celebration and remembrance.
- The Latin American holiday is celebrated on November 1st and 2nd, with the most noteworthy festivals and celebrations happening in Central and Southern Mexico.
- People celebrate the lives of loved ones by creating altars decorated with marigolds, photos, special
 possessions and favorite foods that evoke their memory.

Immigration Detention

A sprawling and unjust system that wrongfully targets and inhumanely detains immigrants.

- No matter where someone came from or how they arrived in the United States, they deserve to be treated with dignity and respect.
- Immigration detention is the unjust practice of incarcerating immigrants while they await a decision on their immigration status or potential deportation.
- In addition to targeting low income people of color, the government locks up asylum seekers, longterm residents who have been caught up in the criminal justice system, undocumented individuals, pregnant women and families with children – even babies in abysmal conditions where a culture of human rights abuses permeates.
- For the past three decades the government has put hundreds of thousands of immigrants behind bars at a massive human, financial and moral cost.

- Both private and public interests are deeply invested in the continuation of locking people up. The
 shameful financial incentives in immigration detention have led to skyrocketing detention numbers
 with taxpayers paying more than \$2 billion each year and families paying the ultimate price by being
 forcibly separated from loved ones.
- Immigration in the U.S. has become a financial market where people's lives are being treated as profit.
- Immigration jails are grave and dangerous places where lives are at risk and people are dying.

Deaths in Detention

Immigration detention should not be a death sentence.

- <u>Recent investigations into deaths in detention</u> have found that inadequate medical care at detention centers has contributed to numerous deaths.
- Since 2003, 164 men and women have died in immigration detention. This year alone, there have been ten deaths in detention centers at the hands of ICE.
- Medical standards developed and implemented by ICE, have proven inadequate time and again leading to preventable deaths of people in their custody.
- No life is second hand. Medical care shouldn't be either.
- Contrary to ICE's claims, its <u>inspections process is a complete sham</u>. It allows rampant abuses, substandard medical care, and other violations to continue undetected—sometimes with fatal consequences.
- In no uncertain terms, ICE has proven they are incapable of caring for people in their custody.

Connecting Day of the Dead to Deaths in Detention

Bringing awareness to the lives lost in immigration detention.

- Immigrants are dying untimely deaths in government custody. With today's event we demand justice and that immigrant lives be valued, remembered and celebrated.
- Day of the Dead is about remembering the lasting impact of loved ones, no family deserves to wonder if their loved one's death while in the government's custody could have been prevented.
- Today we honor the lives of those lost to the unjust and inhumane detention system.

Take Action

We demand immigrant lives be treated with dignity and respect.

- ICE must be held accountable when someone in their custody dies. We demand ICE conduct an investigation into the ten deaths that have occurred this year and publicly release the findings no later than January 30, 2017.
- Facilities where people have died in detention must be shut down as a first step towards ending the inhumane detention system in its entirety. This starts with shutting down LaSalle Detention Center in Louisiana where there have been three deaths this year alone.

#DetentionDeaths

- Manuel Cota-Domingo died while in ICE custody at Eloy Detention Center after an eight-hour delay in transferring him to the emergency room.
- Fernando Dominguez-Valdivia contracted and died from pneumonia--a preventable and treatable illness--during his 82 days in immigration detention.
- Victor Ramirez Reyes died of a treatable condition at Elizabeth Detention Center as the result of grossly substandard medical care. Mr. Ramirez received double doses of his medications on a daily basis because medical staff did not follow proper protocols.

Immigrant rights groups hold vigil for immigrants who have died in detention and demand ICE stop the deaths

Immigrants are dying untimely deaths in government custody, ICE must be held accountable

"People are dying due to medical neglect with no accountability. The evidence is clear and indisputable; ICE needs to start shutting down detention centers now."
